

Fudge Brownie Pudding Cake

As it bakes, the batter separates into 2 layers: a soft pudding on bottom and a fudgy cake layer on top.



1 c flour>>1/2 c + 3 T unsweetened cocoa powder>>2/3 c granulated sugar>>2 t baking powder>>1/4 t salt>>1/2 c milk>>2-1/2 T canola oil>>2 T black coffee>>2 t vanilla extract>>1/3 c packed light brown sugar>>1-3/4 c boiling water>>

Heat oven to 375 degrees. Have ready an 8-inch square, 2 inch deep baking dish. Whisk flour, 1/2 cup cocoa powder & next 3 ingredients in a medium bowl until combined. In a 1-cup glass measure, combine milk, oil, coffee & vanilla; stir into flour mixture until blended. Spread in ungreased baking dish.

Mix brown sugar & remaining 3 tablespoons cocoa; sprinkle evenly over batter, slowly pour boiling water evenly over surface of batter----don't stir. Carefully place in oven. Bake 30 minutes, or until top is just set & a wooden pick inserted halfway into center comes out with moist crumbs. Cool in pan on wire rack 10 minutes. Serve warm dusted with confectioners' sugar & topped with whipped cream.

Yard Waste Guidelines

Yard waste pick up is on the same scheduled pick up dates of regular trash, which is Fridays in non holiday weeks.

Residents must place clippings and other loose yard waste in a 20 gallon brown biodegradable bag or a 30 gallon container, clearly marked "YARD WASTE". Yard waste mixed with solid waste will not be collected.

Tree, shrub and bush trimmings are to be securely tied together forming an easily handled bundle not exceeding four feet in length or 35 pounds in weight. Cotton string must be used to bundle the material.

Organic Weed Control

Chemicals aren't always necessary for weed control. Prevention is the best way to organically control weeds. A good layer of organic mulch around plantings prevents weed germination. If they do grow, be sure to prevent spreading by cutting them down before they go to seed. Hand pulling is a tried and true method. A plastic barrier is also an option. Newspaper is another barrier option. This is a great option because it is organic and can be turned into the soil the following Spring.

Other options? Try pouring boiling water over the crown of the plant (be careful not to burn yourself). Vinegar also works. Use a spray bottle to saturate the leaves. Plants usually die and wither within 4 to 48 hours. Don't like any of these choices? Well, you could always get some goats. Goats are great weeders because of the way they eat. They chew the plant down to the nub and move on. ©©©
