Egg-cellent: Though you may have thought it was nameless, the squiggly white string that you see when you break an egg open is the chalaza (cha-lay-za). Inside the egg, it serves the function of holding the yolk in place.

Schnitzel

Schnitzel, the German word for cutlet, is used to describe meat that has been breaded and fried. It is prepared with chicken or veal cutlets. Serve with buttered egg noodles sprinkled with fresh parsley. Have lemon wedges that can be squeezed over the cutlets.

2 large eggs>>1 garlic clove, minced>>1/2 tsp. minced fresh parsley>>salt & pepper>>1 cup Panko bread crumbs>>1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese>>4 cutlets, veal or chicken (about 6 oz. each) pounded to an even 1/4 inch thickness>>4 T. olive oil>>1 T. butter>>1/4 cup dry white wine>>1/2 cup chicken broth>>1 T fresh lemon juice

In shallow bowl beat eggs with garlic, parsley & 1/2 teaspoon each, salt & pepper. In separate bowl, combine crumbs & cheese. Dip each cutlet into egg mixture to coat completely, then dredge in crumb mixture, patting it on with your fingers.

Heat 2 tablespoons oil in large skillet over medium-high heat. Cook 2 cutlets until golden brown & cooked through, about 3 minutes per side, transfer to platter. Add remaining 2 tablespoons oil to pan, reduce heat to medium, repeat with remaining 2 cutlets.

Wipe skillet, heat butter until melted. Add wine, heat 30 seconds. Stir in broth & lemon juice, simmer 2 minutes. Season with salt & pepper. To serve, pour broth mixture over cutlets.
