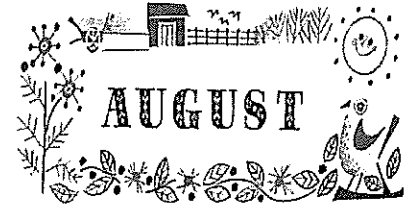
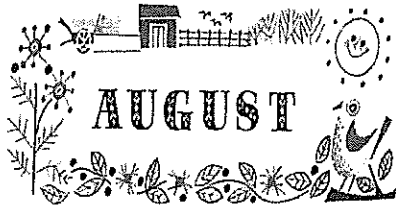

Tree Commission Meeting

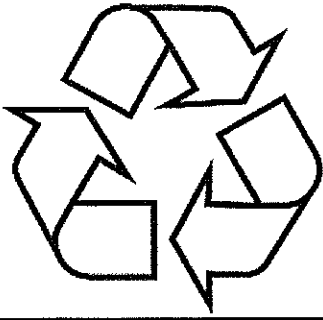

Air and Noise Pollution from CEI: A Relevant Concern for Timberlake

The information below was sent to Ms. Zele, the CEI Representative, who attended the Timberlake Council Meeting in April 2015. It was emailed May 1st and snail mailed to her, and there has been no response. If anyone is in agreement with this, letting your feelings known to CEI would be important.

Dear Ms. Zele:

You did a great job for your company, Ms. Zele. The residents of Timberlake walked away as losers as usual...Goliath prevailed and David lost. The reason for this assessment is a review of the exchange between yourself and the residents of Timberlake.

1. A man at the far corner of the building closest to the lake showed the double talk of your corporation by stating "I don't care what stack your pollution came out of, just clean up your mess from your plant". Your response was that the "good neighbor policy" initiated in 1982 was cancelled last Fall 2014. Your good neighbor policy is the most perverse oxymoron ever initiated by corporate America. You still did not state that you would clean up the mess, you just mumbled.
2. Another issue was the constant "humming noise". You side stepped it when you stated that you did not know the particular origin and how it would be fixed. You would look into that. Is it possible that a multi-national company could solve that question after operating that plant for over 60 years?
3. The same lady brought up a question after the humming noise issue...when is the fence along Keewaydin going to be fixed? Just because Thomas Fence is not properly certified because of 911, can't you make a phone call to another fence company that is certified?
4. You were asked about the final removal of the coal pile and the capping process. Your answer was that it would be done according to EPA Standards. Do you not see the irony of your answer since EPA Standards are what you reluctantly have accepted and created the shutdown of your plant?
5. When asked about the CSX traffic, you stated to call CXS. Since it is your plant and your program, wouldn't you know the answer to the amount of CSX traffic needed in the future?
6. We were constantly told that construction would be ongoing for the conversion of the plant. Could you please give us an estimate of how long this construction will continue and at what cost due to our concern about noise pollution?
7. You plead ignorance about the 1 million dollar bond issue mentioned by one of our council members. Could your higher ups please address this matter since it would be nice to pass the savings on to the Village of Timberlake.
8. You never really gave a definitive answer as to a clean up from the pollution of 2014. The Mayor stated that it is ridiculous for us as individuals to go to small claims court, win our case against your fallout, call Sparkle or their competitor to finalize the cleanup. Shouldn't your corporation be responsible for all of the above? There is no dispute as to where this garbage that has fallen on our properties came from. Once again, we received a "definite maybe" answer. This harkens to the theme that your company is judge, jury and hangman. Who made you the final arbiter of your constant polluting?
9. You were asked, is the plant going to be taken down, your response was, no, it will be maintained. Could you give a more definitive answer to your definition of maintenance? Corporate speak can be very fuzzy. Just look at the abandoned steel mills along the route 7 corridor on the Ohio River on the West Virginia and Ohio borderline. The general public was told that those plants were to be maintained and they are the ugliest looking site in all of America.
10. Any chance of any reparations for the Village of Timberlake for your 60 years of dumping on us? Imagine the emotional, mental and physical toll that this community endured. Your corporation has sent reps since the early 50's to pacify this Village. You have broken every promise especially about getting the pollution under control, both noise and particulate matter.

Once again, you did a tremendous job of protecting your corporation. If your last CEO could make 12 million yearly, your company must be flush with money. According to the Plain Dealer, you could also afford to hire 19 lobbyists in Columbus. Please distribute some of your wealth to those who have endured your mismanagement. Put reality into your "good neighbor" program and put up some good old fashioned money to the Village of Timberlake. Why should we grovel at your careless operations and walk away with soot still on our houses?

A prompt reply would be appreciated.

COUNCIL MEETING July 14, 2015

Mayor Cattani opened the meeting with the pledge to the flag at 7:35 PM. After the public portion, Mayor Cattani asked for the roll call of the officers. All council members, the Solicitor and Mr. Roskos were present.

The mayor asked for a motion to approve June 16, 2015 Minutes.

Motion to approve without changes or corrections: Sharma

Seconded: Dicki

Stanton made a correction on page 2 in regards to changing "coal" patch to "cold" patch.

Ayes: Dicki, Stanton, Sharma, Parihar, Trepal

Motion carried; Minutes approved.

SERVICE

Peter Formica informed the Village about the six bids received on June 26th for the road work, ranging from \$665,017.50 to \$762,562.50. The engineer had estimated about \$745,000. The lowest bid was the Shelley Company of Twinsburg, OH, who could come out as early as next 4-5 weeks to begin the work. The Mayor shared a request from the Village Club to not begin work on Eastshore until after the Annual Parade on August 16th. Formica assured the Village that he will complete the OPWC and funding paperwork for the project. It's estimated that the company would be working on the Village for 3-4 weeks.

Mr. Formica clarified that the Village is receiving a grant and a loan for the project equaling to 50%. The grant allows the Village up to \$243,000, if the Village also spends the same amount, after which the loan is in progress; the OPWC guaranteed the Village access to \$150,000 in loans, which is not expected to be used fully as the project will be costing less than \$700,000.

Mr. Stanton thanked the residents for help with the cold patches and wanted to share that a local radio station came out to report on the Village. They were commenting on how residents were leaf-blowing water out of the holes, which they thought was amusing, but is actually the correct way to get water out of the holes for the cold patch, which was about \$100/ton. Mr. Stanton also updated that all equipment is working. Mr. Stanton recommended residents to be wary of the grass in their yards, especially with the recent rains. He also informed the Village that the dumpster, for yard waste, towards the back end of the Village will be removed in 3-4 weeks.

Mr. Stanton requested to please send all issue with Service his way, via either phone or email, so that we can collectively continue to improve on the look of the Village. He also answered one of the queries posted in the public portion in regards to obtaining more signs in the Village for children crossing the roads, who may not be paying attention.

Mr. Stanton introduced Resolution 2015-31, authorizing the Mayor to enter into a contract with Shelley Company for pavement improvements. The contract is for \$665,017.50.

Motion to approve without changes or corrections: Stanton

Seconded: Gasier

All were in favor of the Resolution; Motion approved.

SAFETY:

Chief Esser provided the monthly police report, citing 27 traffic violations, 2 written warnings, 2 criminal reports, 4 traffic reports, 15 general reports, 4 misdemeanor arrests, 82 house checks, 80 park checks, and 30 beach checks. He also answered an inquiry posted during the public portion in regards to drivers running stop signs in the Village. The Police Department has been tracking this and will enforce parking along with adhering to stop signs, taking actions against those who are not following the rules appropriately through warnings and stop signs. Chief Esser also brought up the idea of starting an organized Community Watch, owned and operated by the residents, allowing them to have a venue to share all their concern and better the safety within the Village. The Chief proposed to begin this organization with the assistance of not only residents, but also the Village Club.

Ms. Parihar introduced Resolution 2015-32, authorizing the Mayor to enter into a three year contract with the City of Eastlake for fire protection and rescue squad services for the Village commencing January 1, 2016. The Mayor explained that the Resolution had to be passed again due to language change.

Motion to approve without changes or corrections: Parihar
Seconded: Sharma
All were in favor of the Resolution; Motion approved.

Ms. Parihar introduced Resolution 2015-33, confirming the promotion on a probationary basis of Joseph Teresi to the position of patrolman, Class V, in the Village. Chief Esser explained that all volunteer officers start at minimum wage, after 3 months, they receive a pay of \$8.50/hour, after the second probationary period, it's \$9.00/hour.

Motion to approve without changes or corrections: Parihar

All were in favor of the Resolution; Motion approved.

Ms. Parihar introduced Resolution 2015-34, authorizing the Mayor to enter into a three year contract with IGM Copy Products, Inc. The Mayor explained this was a no cost contract.

All were in favor of the Resolution; Motion approved.

Ms. Parihar introduced Ordinance 2015-15, establishing section 208.07, public records retention policy. The Mayor explained that the ordinance adopts a retention schedule for a meeting for the Records Commission, following up on a prior rejected schedule. Ms. Parihar then motioned to put the ordinance on 1st reading.

Motion to put the Ordinance on 1st reading: Parihar

All were in favor of placing the ordinance on 1st reading.

SEWERS

Mr. Gasier reported there was 2 inches of rain due to a storm the prior week and he received 3 calls on slow basin removal, but none for flooding. He has marked 31 catch basins that need to be cleaned on several roads; there is also a necessity for a culvert on Lakeshore blvd., which needs to be installed by the property owner as per Ordinance 1024.01 passed in 1948. Mr. Gasier is in the process of getting plumbers out because he is unable to use the Timberlake snake to identify the blockages. He asks the residents to please recommend any good plumbers in the area who would be able to do the flushing at a lower cost. He also eliminated some break points that ended up being just pipe misalignment, which will be focused on in the near future. Ms. Trepal asked if it was necessary to have a culvert in each driveway, to which Mr. Gasier replied yes. The Mayor is hoping to have the culverts scalloped by the state after their waterline project. There was some discrepancy on the diameter of the culvert, which Mr. Gasier will check up on.

VILLAGE HALL

Dr. Sharma reported that she would be changing the pest control inspection from quarterly to biannually, as it is \$100 each time. She also wanted to remind renters of the Village Hall to ensure to clean up after all events, otherwise the return deposit will be reduced. There are already bookings for August 2016.

Dr. Sharma introduced Resolution 2015-35, revisiting the guidelines for the content of the Timberlake Times Newsletter. The Recording Secretary, Aishwarya Parihar, who also serves as the Editor of the Timberlake Times, clarified that this resolution was drafted to revise a prior resolution that limited the materials previously submitted along with clarifying some discrepancies and ensuring to keep a positive message in the Times.

PARKS & TREES

Mrs. Trepal informed that 20 to 25 children were a part of the Village Summer Recreation Program this year; she received positive reviews from each one. The Chief had a Safety Day with the children, who also enjoyed a beach day. The Eagle Scouts will be mulching the Park, providing the labor for free on July 25, tentatively. Mrs. Trepal is currently waiting on the engineer's report for the stairs, who will be returning the measure the base.

Mrs. Trepal introduced Resolution 2015-36, authorizing the Mayor to enter into a contract with tree Service Now for tree removal services.

Mrs. Trepal introduced Resolution 2015-41, confirming the appointment of Abby Batoki to the position of Program Teacher for the Village Summer Recreation Program.

Motion to approve without changes or corrections: Trepal

Seconded: Sharma

All were in favor of the Resolution; Motion approved.

FINANCE

Mr. Dicki informed the citizens that as per Peter Formica, the state will be providing 50% of the revenue for fixing the roads along with a low interest loan due to AA rating, which is the highest rating. We are also able to take out the loan at our convenience, as it takes only about a week or two to receive the funds. As for the inquiry on emails and letters to the Mayor, the policy is that any letters sent to elected officials will be published on the Timberlake website as soon as possible.

Mr. Dicki introduced Resolution 2015-42, approving and directing payment of certain bills by the Village. Chief Esser explained that Lake Health charged the incorrect amount for physicals for the last 3 police officers that were sent in, which Ms. Parihar will be investigating and disputing with a contact at the hospital as it infringes on prior contract. The bill in totality was for \$1038, but we are to actually pay \$507. This was amended on the bills.

Mr. Dicki presented Ordinance 2015-17, adopting a temporary appropriation for the Village for the fiscal year commencing January 1, 2016, for the submission to the Auditor of Lake County. He then motioned to suspend the three reading rule for Ordinance 2015-13.

All were in favor of suspension of the rule.

Motion to approve Ordinance 2015-17: Dicki

All were in favor of the Ordinance; Motion approved.

Mr. Dicki presented Ordinance 2015-18, establishing a "Capital Road Project" fund for the Village. He then motioned to suspend the three reading rule for Ordinance 2015-13.

All were in favor of suspension of the rule.

Motion to approve Ordinance 2015-18: Dicki

Seconded: Gasier

All were in favor of the Ordinance; Motion approved

Mr. Stanton reminded all residents that the deadline for filing property taxes was July 15th, 2015. The Mayor reminded that the deadline for filing for candidacy was August 6th for the upcoming ballot. Mr. Laudato then addressed an issue brought up in the public portion of the meeting. He said he will have to see the house that was said to be unseemly and then will work with the Police Department along with the City to address the issues. Furthermore, he clarified that the new lawsuit will not affect the roadwork; the law firm will forward the litigation after it is filed with the insurance carrier.

The Mayor asked for a motion to adjourn the meeting at 8:41.

TIMBERLAKE BUDGET MEETING July 14, 2015

Mayor Cattani opened the meeting with the pledge to the flag at 7:09 PM. Mr. Dicki started off the meeting discussing the historical spending in 2014, stating that it wasn't our best year as there were extra expenditures and we spent more than we received. However, all committee members and the Police Department kept in the budget. In fact, the Police Department kept salaries substantially under the budget, which Chief Esser assures will happen again this year. For 2015, the revenue streams look much better and spending is stable.

Mr. Dicki presented the budget for 2016 which is identical to the budget in 2015 minus expenditure for garbage pick-up along with showing the finances for the road repair project. Mr. Dicki then opened the floor for concerns by the committee members.

Mrs. Trepal requested some advice in regards to keeping within the budget and staging the trees or asking for more money to fix all the trees at one time. The entire council recommended staging the trees. Mr. Stanton stated that staging the trees is better for the life cycle of the trees, as well. Mr. Gasier spoke in regards to the safety threat the dead trees may pose. Mrs. Trepal says that the tree inspector claimed that the trees will fall down anyway. The Mayor says that liability is difficult to examine due to the condition of the trees.

Mr. Stanton recommended to take 10% of his budget next year and put it aside for any potential repairs for Village equipment.

Line items of the budget were discussed and reviewed.

The Mayor asked for a motion to adjourn the meeting at 7:22.

COUNCIL MEETING June 16, 2015

Mayor Cattani opened the meeting with the pledge to the flag at 7:31 PM. After the public portion, Mayor Cattani asked for the roll call of the officers. All council members, the Solicitor and Mr. Roskos were present.

The Mayor asked for a motion to approve May 19, 2015 Council Minutes.

Motion to approve without changes or corrections: Dicki

Seconded: Gasier

Mrs. Trepal made a correction on page 3 in regards to the number of trees in the Village that were dead. The Minutes listed 33 and were changed to say 12.

Ayes: Dicki, Stanton, Sharma, Parihar, Trepal, Gasier

Motion carried; Minutes approved.

SAFETY:

Chief Esser provided the monthly police report, citing 17 traffic violations, 3 misdemeanor citations, 54 house checks, 39 park checks, and 42 beach checks. There were also 3 criminal reports and 2 traffic reports completed. The chief also gave an update in regards to the installation of computers, which is to occur in the following weeks, along with new training sessions for the officers, scheduled for later in the month.

Ms. Parihar introduced Resolution 2015-23, authorizing the Mayor to enter into a contract with the City of Eastlake for fire protection and emergency medical services for the Village. Per clarifications by the Mayor, this contract will automatically renew in 3 years.

Motion to approve without changes or corrections: Parihar

Seconded: Stanton

All were in favor of the Resolution; Motion approved.

Ms. Parihar introduced Resolution 2015-24, confirming the appointment on probationary basis of Francis G. Colangelo to the position of special patrolman in the Village.

Motion to approve without changes or corrections: Parihar

Seconded: Stanton

All were in favor of the Resolution; Motion approved.

Ms. Parihar introduced Resolution 2015-25, confirming the appointment on probationary basis of Brettley E. Grau to the position of special patrolman in the Village.

Motion to approve without changes or corrections: Parihar

Seconded: Gasier

All were in favor of the Resolution; Motion approved.

Ms. Parihar introduced Resolution 2015-26, confirming the appointment on probationary basis of Peter Krause to the position of patrolman in the Village.

Motion to approve without changes or corrections: Parihar

Seconded: Trepal

All were in favor of the Resolution; Motion approved.

Ms. Parihar introduced Resolution 2015-27, authorizing the Mayor to enter into a contract with Verizon Wireless on behalf of the Western States Contracting Alliance for wireless services.

Motion to approve without changes or corrections: Parihar

Seconded: Gasier

All were in favor of the Resolution; Motion approved.

All three officers were sworn in by the Mayor and congratulated on their new roles.

SEWERS

Mr. Gasier reported that despite the heavy rains, not many issues were reported. It seemed that after inspection, 70 Eastshore Blvd. had a basin that needed to be cleaned and snaked along with 71 Shawondassee, which Mr. Gasier will address. There was also standing water on 69 Shawondassee, which Mr. Gasier noted. No calls by residents were made in regards to heavy rains or flooding. Mr. Gasier reported that he will check all the catch basins and clean them as necessary. Mr. Gasier also estimates about 6-8 breakpoints that need to be fixed.

PARKS & TREES

Mrs. Trepal was able to get three different estimates for tree removal in the Village. In totality, there are 33 trees with issues of which 12 trees are dead and 2 require some maintenance work. Mrs. Trepal was given quotes by three different companies, estimating to about \$26,000, \$16,000, and \$14,000. She will be finalizing the deal with *Tree Service Now* as it is the best price, taking care of the biggest dead trees this year while the remainder will be fixed next year due to budget restrictions.

Mr. Dicki, the Mayor, and Mrs. Trepal also looked at the beach stairs with an engineer, who verbally said that they were structurally sound, but may require some cement deposit at the bottom for enhanced safety. The engineer also had some other minor repair suggestions for the area and will be drafting a report.

Mrs. Trepal was able to contact an Eagle Scout in the area who expressed that the Boy Scouts would enjoy mulching the playground as an Eagle Project. Mrs. Trepal will be working on this in the upcoming weeks.

The Summer Camp this year was a huge success with 17 participants, 2 volunteers, 1 program director, and 2 aids. The children are able to do many activities, such as mini golf, and will be watching a movie this week. Mrs. Trepal suggested that she will have a firm deadline along with a penalty for next year for applications as this year they were rolling in until the start of the camp, making buying supplies on a timely manner difficult.

SERVICE

Mr. Stanton reported that all equipment was back in service and work was resumed. Mr. Stanton hopes to continue fixing the ruts, medians, and islands along with seeding and trimming of the Village areas.

Mr. Stanton has received much inquiry in regards to the repairs on the roads. He is projecting that the project may finish as early as this year. In the upcoming week, Mr. Stanton will be getting cold patches on some of the worst potholes in the Village, fixing the largest holes then the smallest. The Service Department has informed Mr. Stanton that they release one truck a day for the repairs, so volunteers will be needed.

The Mayor presented a recent request from Raymond Miller in regards to extending the existing berm on Lakeshore Blvd. for the ease of residents in the area. As ODOT owns the road, there will need to be further discussion with the organization along with Pete Formica at CT. If an extension is granted, it could also cause issues to the sewage system. Two residents after the meeting informed the council that this was an issue that was voted against by the council many years ago and will have to be voted on once again.

Mr. Stanton recommended residents to be wary of the vegetation in their yard as any obstruction of view for individuals pulling out their cars could cause a visibility issue in the Village. Mr. Stanton says that complaints in regards to this will require him to have the area checked.

FINANCE

Mr. Dicki informed the Council of the finances for road repairs with the borrowing process continuing. The OMAP application has given the Village AA ratings, allowing the Mayor to borrow \$450,000 for bonds to be used on the road repair project. John Roskos presented the Fiscal Certificate for the project, certifying the project has a life of 5 years along with the maturity calculated by the state.

Mr. Dicki presented Ordinance 2015-13, authorizing the Mayor to sell "Notes" for the road construction project. He then motioned to suspend the three reading rule for Ordinance 2015-13.

All were in favor of suspension of the rule.

All were in favor of the Ordinance; Motion approved.

Mr. Stanton clarified that Ordinance 2015-13 allows us to have flexibility in regards to how much money is borrowed, not locking us into a set amount, so that if the cost is less than anticipated, not as much would need to be borrowed. Mr. Dicki added that the Ordinance was left open so that if money was left over from the road repair, it could also be used for other projects, such as the creation of sidewalks on Lakeshore. The Mayor also informed the public that last Friday he opened bids for the roads and will receive more information in regards to this by this Friday.

Mr. Dicki introduced Resolution 2015-28, adopting a policy for receipts of public moneys in amounts equaling less than one thousand dollars. It was clarified by Mr. Laudato that this allows flexibility for Council members in regards to making deposits, which would otherwise have to be done daily, even for small dollar amounts. He further explained that the new policy adoption fell under the Ohio Revised Code.

Mr. Dicki introduced Resolution 2015-29, approving and directing payment of last month's bills by the Village.

Mr. Dicki presented Ordinance 2015-14, amending Ordinance 2015-07, allowing the transfer of funds from the storm sewer construction fund to pay for the state examinee's fee. He then motioned to suspend the three reading rule for Ordinance 2015-14.

All were in favor of the Ordinance; Motion approved.

Mr. Stanton introduced Resolution 2015-30, affirming Robert Smith to the Board of Public Affairs.

Seconded: Trepal
All were in favor of the Resolution; Motion approved.

The candidate was sworn in by the Mayor and congratulated on his new role.

VILLAGE HALL

Dr. Sharma reported that during the hood inspection, there was damage found on the dry wall after the last party, which will be fixed in the upcoming weeks. She also informed the Council on carpet cleaning estimates ranging from \$800 to \$500 of which she chose the least expensive option. The cleaning should commence fairly soon. Dr. Sharma stated that bookings for next year had already begun and the online calendar, on the website, was fully functioning.

The Mayor asked for a motion to adjourn the meeting at 8:13.

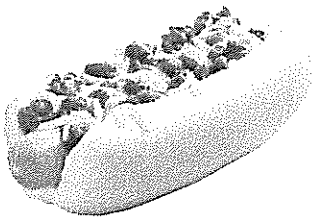

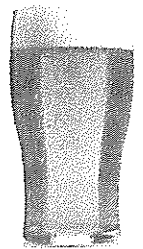
