

#### TIMBERLAKE COUNCIL MEETING October 18<sup>th</sup>, 2016

The Mayor opened the meeting with the pledge of allegiance followed by the public portion at 7:31 PM. He asked for roll call of the officers. All council members were present along with our Solicitor and the Fiscal Officer, except for Ms. Murphy, who was absent.

The Mayor asked for a motion to approve September 20<sup>th</sup>, 2016 Council Minutes.

Motion to approve: Swartz Seconded: R. Sharma

Ayes: Dicki, S. Sharma, R. Sharma, Swartz

Navs: None

Motion carried; Minutes approved.

The Mayor discussed an issue with individuals using personal email addresses to reply to Village business, as compared to the Village email address. He emphasized the importance of using the Village email address as there can be legal issues that arise. Mr. Dicki discussed that the servers that were recommended to be used are extremely insecure. The Fiscal Officer will look into alternative servers and research this issue. The Mayor also talked about using a document management to help the Village become organized with paperwork. Karl and Andy from Meritech Inc. will be coming to the next meeting to discuss their document management solution.

#### **FINANCE**

Mr. Dicki presented Resolution 2016-53, approving and directing payment of certain bills by the Village.

Motion to approve Resolution 2016-53: Dicki

Seconded: S. Sharma

All were in favor of the Resolution; Motion approved.

Mr. Dicki noted that the 10-year Republic Refuge contract is going to have a change in pricing; they will maintain the 2016 price for years 2017 and 2018. Furthermore, we currently have a 5-year fixed after a 10-year loan offer for the roads. Mr. Dicki is working with Huntington to get a fixed 10-year loan.

#### TREES AND RECREATION

Mr. Frank has resigned from the tree committee. Dr. Sharma thanked him for his wonderful service and asked if anyone in the Village would be interested in volunteering for the committee. The Tree Service is coming to work around the Village early next week. There was a report of a branch that was hanging by the power lines, which Tree Service will fix. The new trees in the Village that were acquired this year are doing fine so far.

#### **SERVICE**

Mr. Swartz stated that the truck is ready for the winter and the contract for the salt was returned. He is concerned about the salt bin itself, as there are a few holes in the roof. The Mayor asked for a list next month of excess equipment, so it can be put up for bids. Mr. Swartz brought up the idea of posting the items for sale online, but the Mayor discouraged it. The Mayor recommended doing an auction at the Village for the equipment that the solicitor will look into.

#### **SEWERS**

Ms. Sharma and the Mayor informed the Village that all catch basins have been vacuumed, the lines between the catch basins have been flushed, the main lines are now being flushed, a new catch basin was put in, one catch basin was lowered, and several areas were found where pipes didn't connect. That work will be done until about the end of October along with any other issues that may arise with the sewers during that time. Mr. Formica presented a document by EPA on comprehensive stormwater management. He noted that a new plan will need to be submitted to the EPA with updated ordinances by the end of this year. The Mayor and Mr. Formica went to a stormwater management meeting to discuss these changes. They also met with the Chagrin River Watershed Partners for further guidance. Mr. Formica went through their comprehensive plan and highlighted all of the areas that were suggested or required for the Village to adopt. Two ordinances pertaining to stormwater management and sediment control will need to be changed. The Mayor noted that the council may need to have a planning and zoning meeting after next month's meeting to go over the records management system and the stormwater management document.

#### VILLAGE HALL

The Mayor presented Ms. Murphy's report. The hall is being rented well and things are going smoothly with the Village.

#### **SAFETY**

Mr. Stanton noted that a cruiser had a collision with a deer; as it was an animal, the Village's deductible is waived and the cruiser is currently being fixed. He also went to a meeting last month where current grants were presented for communities. It was recommended that communities cooperate on getting these grants. Mr. Stanton noted that he would put in a grant request for a new cruiser. The negative aspect of this is that the grant must be submitted by October to December; it is awarded in March, and the earliest we would see the cruiser is early 2018. One cruiser currently is at 30,000 miles, while the others all have 100,000+ miles on it. Mr. Stanton has recommended having the service personnel and council members use the cruiser to go to meetings and conduct business for the Village, in order to keep the cruisers running and maximize our assets with it while it is still viable. The vehicles are unmarked, as well. The Mayor voiced some concerns in regards to this and the solicitor said he would be willing to look into it further. Officer Clarich presented the police report. There were 38 reports generated in the past month. 30 citations were issued. There were 134 house checks, 61 beach checks, and 77 playground checks.
