### Return to Timberlake




**Public Comment, Good & Welfare:**

Mayor informed the public that they have 3 minutes per subject to present their concerns, comments, or questions to Council and they would be address later in the meeting.

Gary Gray 47 Keewaydin request to have the tree be placed on the list have it removed on 47 & 49 Keewaydin. Nancy Marra informed him that they are already placed on the list. Gary stated that if anyone needs animals removed from their yard, he has placed a critter form at the table by the entrance to the room.

Gina Suppa 19 East Shore read ORC 737.11 in reference the police force are the enforcement ordinances of the municipality. She stated since she had lived here the police force has enforced the ordinances to include private parking, parking on tree lawns, parking in right of way, abandon vehicles, vehicles of commercial, vehicles that are not placed correctly. Chief Tryon and Prior Chiefs have enforced the parking violations by citing people and giving warnings and were procedures in place. She would like to know what the Village is going to do and go

about enforcing some of these parking violations which are in the control of our Police Department and there are procedures already in place, there were warning citations and a police report attached to the violation. She would like the Safety Director to address how are you going to have police enforce of these ordinance violations that pertain to parking. In reference to prior meetings I have sat back and listen and that we cannot get our police to do anything and we have a hard time with that because we don’t pay them enough or we paid them \$1.00 per year. It concerns me because if we cannot get the police to do some of these things, what are we going to do and what is our security and are we receiving a false security because they don’t have motivation by salary to do their position.

Bob Smith 21 Keewaydin – It has come to his attention about boats, campers, trailers and trash cans. There are three houses in Village which should be torn down. It is unacceptable for residents to have water in their yards when it rains. The Mayor has fix one and Thank you. Steps to the beach are 50 years, now you have to pay \$10 to go down them, I won’t go down them. The fence outside Village hall is a disgrace. Service truck is 20 years, you think you can get another 2 years out of it. I doubt it. I will not put my name on it anymore to work on it. You have vehicles that have not moved in two years or under cover and Council is worried about boats, campers, trailer and trash cans.

Charlotte Hall 53 East Shore– This is a thought we have space in the service yard, maybe we should offer storage/rental for a space for parking trailers, boats and vehicles.

Ryan Conrad 37573 Lakeshore Blvd. read in Timberlake Times about repair sewers in the Village and I would like me ensure that Lakeshore Blvd. be included. Sidewalks and the bike path being extended on Lakeshore Blvd. Just want to bring water issue and the sidewalks.

Rodney Connelly 47 East Shore Blvd. – I'm not concerned about the boat, trailers and campers if they are in good condition. I do not like you can drive through the Village with weeds on property that are high. In reference to the beach every summer we go to great lengths to make it look nice however private beach owners do not look and nice and they should be held responsible for keeping their property clean of debris.

Ken Zaller 34751 Lakeshore Blvd. – Thank you for putting the sign back up on Lakeshore. Every time it rains I get water in my garage. When I was Council we went door to door and everyone on Lakeshore was in favor of having sidewalks.

Shane Brugler 53 Keewaydin what are we going to do about the herd of deer?

Mayor extended a Thank you to Frank Geramo for repairing the sign on Lake Shore Blvd.

A resolution approving a salary increase and uniform allowance for the Full Time Police Chief of the Village of Timberlake, Ohio, Police Department and declaring an emergency.

A motion was made by Nancy Marra and seconded by Stanley Roediger Jr. to suspend the rules. All members of Council that were present voted yes.

Discussion: Fiscal Officer Clapp and Councilmember Hardwick requested verification about the uniform allowance if it was only for the Chief or the whole Police Department. Mayor stated the \$2,000 uniform allowance is for the whole Police Department.

A motion was made by Stanley Roediger Jr. and seconded by Cynthia Hardwick to pass

Resolution No. 2021-31. Five members of Council that were present voted yes. Shannon Sharm voted no.

Resolution No. 2021-32

A resolution authorizing the Mayor and Fiscal Officer to negotiate and execute an agreement with the City of Eastlake to provide road salt for the year 2021-2022 winter season and declaring an emergency.

Discussion: Fiscal Officer informed Council that this year's State Purchasing cost for road salt is \$43.61 per ton and to last years was \$47.98 per ton. The City of Eastlake participates in the State Purchasing for road salt.

A motion was made by Nancy Marra and seconded by Shannon Sharma to suspend the rules. All members of Council that were present voted yes.

A motion was made by Shannon Sharma and seconded by Dr. Ritu Sharma to pass Resolution No. 2021-32. All members of Council that were present voted yes.

**Department Reports:**

Mayor:

Mayor stated he has completed sewer repairs on Keewaydin and Lake Shore Blvd.

Solicitor:

Nothing at this time.

Council Members:

Cynthia Hardwick-

She has been researching grants and have found that most grants require matching funds.

Krista Kanuch-

Krista stated that the Village Hall committee has been busy changing the language in the contract and having resolutions passed.

Nancy Marra-

Nancy reminded the residents that when trees are removed a new tree is to be planted.

Stanley Roediger-

Stanley stated that at the end of August we are 10% under budget.

Stanley state that at the Finance Committee meeting the Service Department gave the finance committee a wish list of about \$10,000 on items they need plus an estimate for a new truck of \$56, 000. We will have to replacing the 2014 Police Cruiser, estimate cost to replace is \$43,000.

Stanley stated the Council is continuing to looking at fee schedule changes for the zoning department in which was started earlier this year, and will request a resolution be written for the October meeting so we could have three reading and the effective

date for the changes would be January 1, 2022.

Stanley stated he has received quotes to replace the fence in front of village hall and the estimates are between \$3,200 - \$4,095.

Stanley stated he has received quotes to replace the beach gate and the estimates are between \$4,000 - \$5,700. However, the contractor indicated the gate would not be installed until winter or next spring.

Dr. Ritu Sharma-

Dr. Sharma stated she has following up on a complaint she received about someone cutting trees on CIE property and a branch came down and damaged the wires along with impacting the residents house. Police Chief stated a police report was taken along with photos and tree limb was broken and not cut down.

Shannon Sharma

Shannon stated the sewer lines within the village has been a problem for several years and the Mayor is currently doing spot repairs.

Fiscal Officer:

Village Council had their exiting audit report on September 13<sup>th</sup> with State Auditor's. Council will receive an email from the State Auditor when the audit is available to be release to the public. Once the State Auditor release the Audit for Yr. 2018 and 2019 I recommend the audit be placed on the Village website. Council remember as the State Auditor mention in the exiting audit report nothing is public until they release it.

Council I sent you an email with the link for the Ohio Sunshine Law/Public Records webinar training being held on September 30<sup>th</sup> from 9-12. You are required to attend this training once during your current four term in office. Please remember to print of your certificate and give it to me for your

personnel file because the State Auditor do check for these when they do the Audit.

Informed Council that starting next month she maybe transferring money from our savings (Star Ohio) to the regular checking account to cover bills.

Police Chief:

Read the August report as follows – 911 (4); Administrative Referrals (4); Animal (5); A threat of an Assault (1); Assist (7); Beach complaints (4); Civil (3); Community Policing (78); Hazard (1); House Check (21); Investigation (9); Noise (1); Phone (2); Suicide Attempt (1); Suspicious Circumstance (1); Suspicious Person (2); Theft (1); Trespassing (1) and Welfare Checks (3)

Zoning/Property Maintenance:

Ten permits written for August.

Public Comment and Questions (may be

directed at the Mayor or Council members only, and is limited to 3 minutes per subject): Annette Henderson 49 Keewaydin – if you replace the table, put them up for sale.

Mayor answer the questions about vehicles by referring them to the Village Solicitor we had a committee meeting on how we are going to handle and working on procedures. We have seen some of the corrections. We are working on the trouble spots.

Mayor answers questions:

Reference to Mr. Smith about ordinance on boats and RV that it was on the ballot in reference to the penalties and it didn't pass. There is an option where owners may request for a variance. We rent to the service yard from First Energy and we don't know how long we will be able to rent.

Flooding working on it with the Engineer. Our sewers are under size.

The steps to the beach were leveled last year- they are strong. If we replace them we will have to make them ADA.

Mayor we need to wait one more year to purchase a new truck.

He has talked to other Mayors about the sidewalks and there are talking about putting a bike path through on Lake Shore Blvd.

We have some people that just will not take care of their lawns.

In reference to the deer the City Eastlake had a program at the beginning of the year. There isn't much we can do, however do not feed the deer. Stan state he will contact ODRN to see if they would be able to assist.

**Executive Session:**

A motion was made by Stanley Roediger Jr. and seconded by Shannon Sharma to go into executive session with Village Solicitor to discuss pending ligation with no action will be taken afterwards at 8:55 pm. All members of Council present voted yes.

A motion was made by Stanley Roediger Jr. and seconded by Shannon Sharma for Council resume regular council meeting at 9:04 pm.

**Adjournment:**

A motion was made by Dr. Ritu Sharma and seconded by Shannon Sharma to close and adjourn the regular council meeting. The meeting was adjourned at 9:05 pm.

**Please find some commonly asked about ordinances below:**

**470.07 PROHIBITED STANDING OR PARKING PLACES.**

No person shall stand or park a vehicle, except when necessary to avoid conflict with other traffic or to comply with the provisions of this title, or while obeying the directions of a police officer or a traffic-control device, in any of the following places:

- (a) Within the front yard setback of any residential home, except upon a driveway improved by dust-free gravel, asphalt, concrete or other hard surface;
- (b) On any portion of the grass center strips or median strips, respectively, within the Village; (Ord. 1990-8. Passed 5-15-90.)
- (c) In the center strip between the improved portions of any roadway and on any of the triangularly-shaped dedicated parcels of land formed by the intersections of the improved roadways of the Village;
- (d) At any place within the Village on Lake Shore Boulevard, also known as S.R. 283. (Prior Code § 452.03(a)(18) - (20)) (Ord. 1962-4. Passed 6-12-62.)

**470.08 SNOW EMERGENCIES.**

- (a) A snow emergency is defined as that time when there has been, in or on any of the streets or roads of the Village, an accumulation of snow, sleet, hail or ice, of two inches or more.
- (b) No person shall park or cause to be parked, or permit or suffer to remain parked, any vehicle on any street or road within the Village during any time or period when a snow emergency condition exists, as defined in division (a) of this section.
- (c) Any member of the Police Department is hereby authorized to provide for the removal of any vehicle parked on any of the streets or roads in the Village during a period of snow emergency, to such garage or other place which the Police Department deems proper. Any costs incurred in such removal or storage shall be paid for by the owner of such vehicle, in addition to any fines or penalties which may be imposed on the owner or operator of said vehicle.
- (d) The Director of Public Safety shall cause all streets and roads in the Village to be clearly and distinctly marked with proper signs of sufficient size and legibility indicating that all streets within the Village are snow emergency streets. <sup>(SEP)</sup> (Prior Code § 452.12) (Ord. 1996-5. Passed 2-20-96.)

**470.09 PARKING OF COMMERCIAL VEHICLES.**

- (a) As used in this section:
  - (1) "Commercial Vehicle" is defined as any motor vehicle licensed by the State of Ohio, or licensed in any other State, as a commercial vehicle.
  - (2) "Trailer" is defined as every vehicle designed or used for carrying persons or property wholly on its own structure and for being drawn by a motor vehicle,

including any such vehicle when formed by or operated as a combination of a semitrailer and a vehicle of the dolly type, such as agricultural production materials between a local place of storage or supply and the farm when drawn or towed on a street or highway at a speed greater than 25 miles per hour, and a vehicle designed and used exclusively to transport a boat between a place of storage and a marina, or in and around a marina, when drawn or towed on a street or highway for a distance of more than ten miles or at a speed of more than 25 miles per hour.

(ORC 4511.01(M))

(b) No person, company, corporation or any other entity shall park a commercial vehicle with a load capacity in excess of three-quarters of a ton within the Village.

(c) No person, company, corporation or any other entity, shall park a trailer, except as provided in Section 470.10, within the Village.

(Prior Code § 452.13) (Ord. 1985-10. Passed 6-18-85; Ord. 2001-8. Passed 5-15-01.)

**470.10 PARKING AND STORAGE OF RECREATIONAL VEHICLES.**

(a) As used in this chapter:

- (1) "Driveway" is defined as that area of any residential property designed for vehicular ingress to and egress from such property;
- (2) "Parking" means the stationary placement of any vehicle for a continuous period of less than 24 hours;
- (3) "Recreational vehicle" includes boats and means a portable structure, self-propelled or towable by another vehicle, and of such size and weight as not to require special highway movement permits. Such vehicle shall be primarily designed, constructed or modified to provide temporary living quarters or for recreational, camping or travel use, and not for commercial purposes or for profit, and shall include, but not be limited to, the following:
  - A. "Boat" or "boat trailer" includes boats, floats and rafts, plus the normal equipment to transport the same on the highway;
  - B. "Folding tent-trailer" means a canvas folding structure, mounted on wheels and designed for travel and vacation uses;
  - C. "Motorized home" means a portable dwelling designed and constructed as an integral part of a self-propelled vehicle;
  - D. "Pick-up camper" means a structure designed primarily to be mounted on a pick-up or truck chassis and with sufficient equipment to render it suitable for use as a temporary dwelling for travel, recreational and vacation uses; and
  - E. "Travel trailer" means a vehicular portable structure built on a chassis designed to be used as a temporary dwelling for travel, recreational and vacation uses, and permanently identified as a "travel trailer" by the

manufacturer.

(4) "Storage" means the stationary placement of any vehicle for a continuous period in excess of 24 hours; and

(5) "Vehicle" has the same meaning as in Section 402.57.

(b) No person shall park or store any recreational vehicle in the Village, provided, however, that such vehicle may be parked or stored in the Village subject to the following conditions:

(1) A recreational vehicle may be parked or stored in a completely enclosed structure, or outside of a completely enclosed structure, but not in front of the front building line, three feet from the side line, or three feet from the rear property line. In the event the property is a corner lot, there shall be a minimum of three feet from the rear property line, and in no case in front of the front building line of the adjoining structure.

(2) No fixed connections to water, gas, electricity, storm or sanitary sewer facilities shall be attached to the recreational vehicle, except that a temporary electrical connection, not to exceed 24 hours, is permitted for the sole purpose of generating electrical energy to charge up a battery or generating system.

(3) A recreational vehicle shall not be used for living or housekeeping purposes while stored on such lot.

(4) All recreational vehicles must carry a current year's license and/or registration.

(5) A recreational vehicle shall be limited to 25 feet in length from end to end, but not including the size of any hitch or attachment.

(6) Not more than two recreational vehicles shall be granted a permit for parking outside a completely

enclosed structure, except upon permission received from the Police Department for purposes of allowing a visiting recreational vehicle for temporary parking purposes.

(7) Except as provided in division (c) of this section, all recreational vehicles must be fully or partially owned by a resident of the Village.

(c) Recreational vehicles may be parked in the driveway of a premises for a period not to exceed 24 continuous hours in any seven-day period, as a complete exception to the terms and requirements of this section, exclusively for loading, unloading or visitation purposes, provided, however, that the Police Department, upon written notification, shall permit the parking of a recreational vehicle in the driveway of a premises for a period not to exceed 48 continuous hours within a seven-day period exclusively for loading, unloading or visitation purposes, with a maximum limit to this exception of six times per year.

(d) The Planning Commission, with the confirmation of Council, may grant a variance from the restrictions of this section to any applicant upon a showing that the restrictions of this section impose an undue hardship.

(e) Any person storing recreational vehicles within the Village at the time of the passage of this section shall comply with the terms and conditions contained herein on or before 30 days from passage.

**470.11 OVERNIGHT PARKING PROHIBITED.**

No person shall park any motor vehicle upon the streets or highways of the Village on the traveled portion thereof, or between the curbs, between the hours of 1:00 a.m. and 7:00 a.m.
